Activities

The Añihue Reserve is a particularly interesting destination for lovers of the natural environment with the means for an unconventional holiday, to visit one of the most untouched and unspoiled places in the world.

Due to the matchless topography and location of the Añihue Reserve, surrounded by fresh and salt water, immersed in a dense rain forest, there are many outdoor activities to enjoy, such as boat trips, kayak, trekking, walking, watching dolphins, sea lions and blue whales, fishing and other activities.

Ocean activities feature spectacular sightings of Chilean and Peale's dolphins and the majestic blue and humpback whales that thrive in the coastal waters of the Reserve. Scuba divers will have a rare chance to see a wide of variety of ocean life including Sea Stars, Sponges, Anemones, and Crustaceans, among many other species, all of which call the waters of Añihue their home.



Accommodations

We have exclusive, cozy cabins, each one suitable for four guests, with a strategic and privileged location in the Reserve. They are built on a pristine beach approximately 1.5 kilometers long with a spectacular view of the Pacific Ocean and a cluster of islands, islets, and promontories that drop straight into the sea. The cabins are immersed in a dense, ancient rain forest that is typical of the southern part of the country.

The cabins were built and decorated with local materials, and they are comfortably equipped. Energy is supplied by a system of solar panels and wood-burning stoves.

We also have a beautiful larger house with three levels to receive mainly volunteers for exchange programs and/or researchers... for the most adventurous visitors who want to get away from civilization completely. It is located on quiet Añihue Bay, 45 minutes from the entrance to the Reserve, accessible by sailing on the open sea along the coast of the Pacific Ocean.
